

## Background

- + People experiencing homelessness (PEH) are at high risk for adverse consequences from substance use<sup>1</sup>
  - + 26% had used injection drugs
  - + 20% had experienced an overdose
  - + Overdose may cause up to 25% of deaths among PEH<sup>2</sup>
- + Barriers to harm reduction access include distance to harm reduction interventions and frequent displacement<sup>3</sup>
  - + 24% never had personally accessible naloxone, 52% sometimes did, and 24% always did
  - + Fixed sites are difficult to access for those with mobility constraints or who are unable to leave their belongings

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## Background

- + 10,605 people experienced homelessness in San Diego this year<sup>4</sup>
  - + Over 57% (6,110) were unsheltered
  - + Disproportionately BIPOC<sup>5</sup>
- + The East Village averaged 787 unsheltered individuals in 2023<sup>6</sup>
  - + 15% of the unsheltered population of SD
- + Overdose hotspot
  - + Opioid overdose death rate of 185 per 100k<sup>7</sup>
  - + Over 5 times the national average

## What We Do: Education

- + Host and facilitate educational events
  - + Overdose training and naloxone distribution
  - + Safer injection training for trainees, practicing providers
  - + Organize national speakers on harm reduction topics
  - + Harm Reduction elective for pre-clinical medical students
  - + Service learning credit for volunteers



## What We Do: Outreach

+ We distribute

+ Electrolyte drinks and survival supplies (bathing wipes, hand warmers, etc) as entry point


+ Naloxone

- + Safer injection, smoking, and sex supplies (incl works, safer smoking kits, etc)
- + First aid and wound care supplies
- + Participant education and referrals



## How We Do It

- + Approach focuses on dignity and respect, mutual aid, solidarity and trauma informed care
- + On foot, with supplies packed in wagons and backpacks
- + Two teams of four people each
  - + All volunteers undergo 2 hrs of training
  - + One "Team Lead" with extra training
- + Minimal data collection
- + Routes vary based on where people are each day







## Our Budget

- + CA Dept. of Public Health (CDPH)
  - + \$25,000 for supplies from clearinghouse
  - + Naloxone and testing strips are free
- + American Psychiatric Association Foundation grant: \$5,000
  - + Capital purchases (storage racks, wagons, etc), electrolyte drinks, needs assessment funding
- + UCSD: \$250 + storage space
- + Various fundraisers (shirts, stickers, etc)

## Spending from CDPH Clearinghouse Budget by Category July 2023 - June 2024


















































## Facilitators

Barriers


- + Going to where the people are
- + Regulatory environment in California
  - + CDPH provides supplies, budget
- + Supportive and engaged individuals in our community

- + Lack of institutional buy-in, consistent funding
- + Sustainability through volunteer turnover
- + Criminalization of homelessness
- + <u>Lack of available social support</u>, <u>housing, treatment</u>



## Future directions

- + Deepening understanding of who we serve and how we can best serve our participants with multiple methods
  - + HCV, HIV testing and treatment, MOUD
- + Wound care
- + Institute mechanisms for consistent community input
  - + Community barbeque and discussion
  - + Ongoing solicitation of feedback at point of service provision


